FYI, we will have a Congregational Meeting following worship on October 19th. We will present our financial plans and the proposed budget for next year. We will also have an election to replace a Session member whose time in office will expire. Session members are normally elected for a three-year term and no more than two terms can be served consecutively. Dr. Robin Shealy's first term is coming to an end and she has indicated that she is willing to stand for another. In addition, others may be nominated from the floor. Every active member is eligible to vote. Following the meeting, we will adjourn to the Fellowship Hall for a pot-luck dinner. Plan on staying.

By the way, at our most recent Session meeting, it was noted that our PCUSA General Assembly this past summer changed some rules regarding temporary pastoral relations with congregations. Up until now, no relationship could be contracted for more that twelve months at a time. It was noted that just twelve months was rarely enough time to arrange for a transition to new leadership, so the rule was changed to allow these covenants to be as long as thirty-six months. Thus, your Session has asked me to revise our agreement and extend our relationship for that length of time and I agreed. So I guess you are stuck with me for the foreseeable future. And, honestly, I love the thought. You folks are special and I immensely enjoy being your pastor.

David Remembers...

As we approach our 175th anniversary at Liberty Hill Presbyterian, we look back at some of our history. I think back to my first go-round with this church in the 1980's. The church was without an installed pastor at the time and, as summer approached, it was wondered who would handle the lakeside ministry that had begun a couple of years before. As they investigated several possibilities, they learned that I was about to come to Columbia to begin seminary in the fall, so John and Mary Thompson were delegated to come down to Hilton Head Island where Christie and I and our toddler son, David, were living to inquire about our interest. I did not think it would work out, but we agreed to come and meet with the Session and discuss what might come of it. To make a long story short, we ended up making the commitment and we moved to Columbia and the student housing at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary where I was scheduled to begin classes later that summer.

Each Sunday that summer, we commuted from Columbia to Liberty Hill. The ladies of the church were kind enough to welcome us each week to one of their homes for Sunday dinner. There was a rotation among them as to who would host us from one week to the next, an arrangement that was delightful for us as we became acquainted with families each week that we would come to know even better as time went along.

In previous years, your pastors has a manse on Peay's Ferry Road for a home as they served you but in recent years, it had fallen into disrepair and proved unsuitable without significant upgrades. It was finally sold. But traveling from Columbia to Liberty Hill did not allow me the pastoral care opportunities that I felt were appropriate and necessary. So, the church began a search for living opportunities in or near Liberty Hill.

In the spring of 1982, the congregation was offered the home and almost two acres of property adjacent to the church by Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Wardlaw. The Wardlaws owned the general store at the end of our driveway but as they were getting older, they wanted to move to Camden to be closer to handy medical care. The family offered the property to us for \$30,000.

Unfortunately, the church did not have that kind of money and mortgage rates back then where ridiculously high - 15 1/2% to 16 1/2% - so that made no sense, but this was such a wonderful opportunity that we needed to consider it. I said we should just raise it in cash. Some thought that was crazy and impossible, but we proceeded.

Elder Abe Richards headed up a campaign to raise the funds and an announcement on Sunday, June 6, that the entire amount had been raised from over 150 individual, family, and corporate donations with enough over the original amount to allow for needed renovations and upgrades to what had been the Liberty Hill school.

Elder Bud Haese supervised the interior work which included the construction of closets in the master bedroom, the filling in of a door that led from the den into the kitchen so as to make kitchen space more efficient, as well as extensive electrical work. In addition, the house needed a new water heater as well as a new washer and dryer.

The Leiningers moved in later that summer and lived there for the next two years until I accepted the call to the Oakdale church in Clover, SC.
